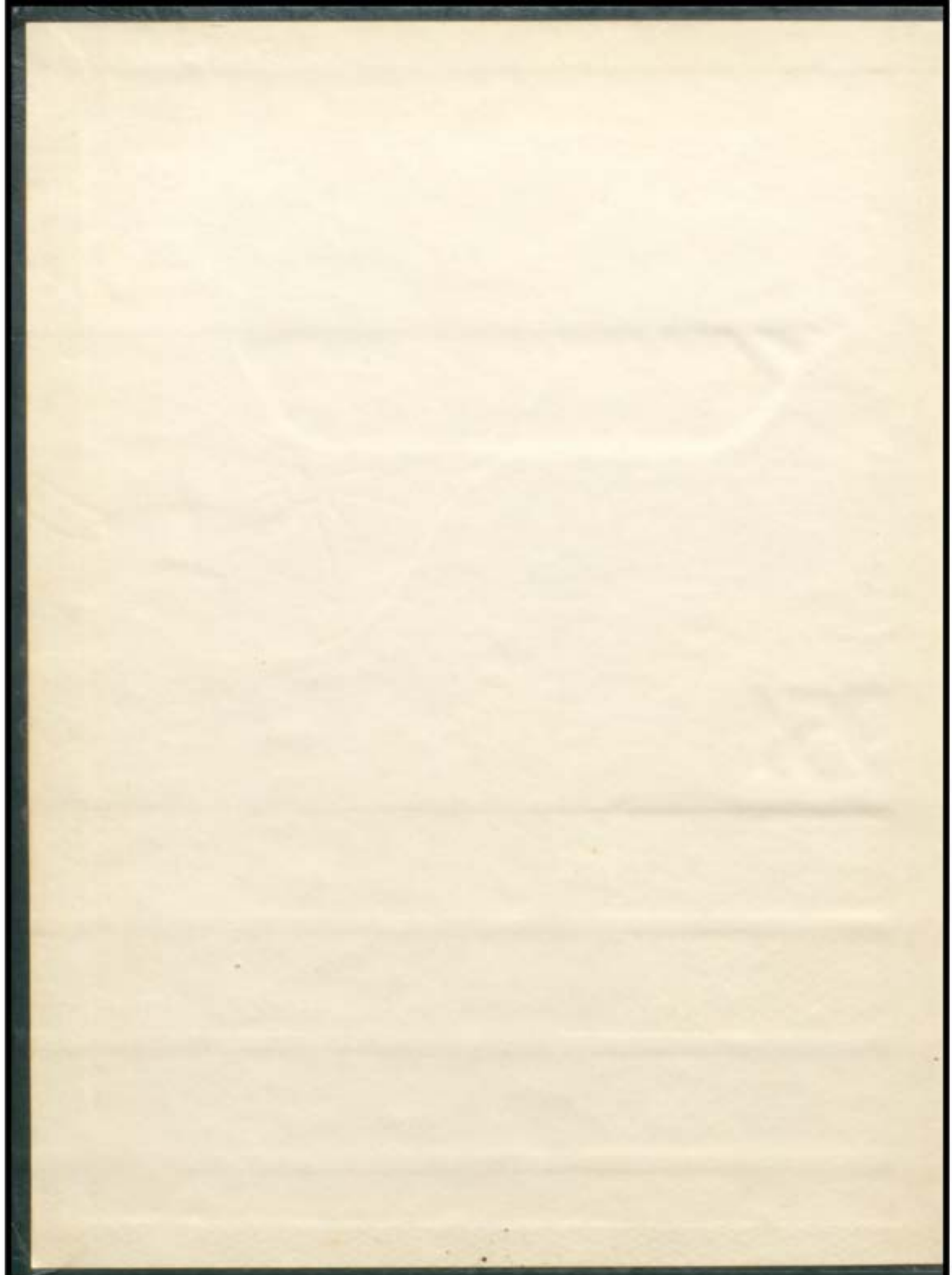
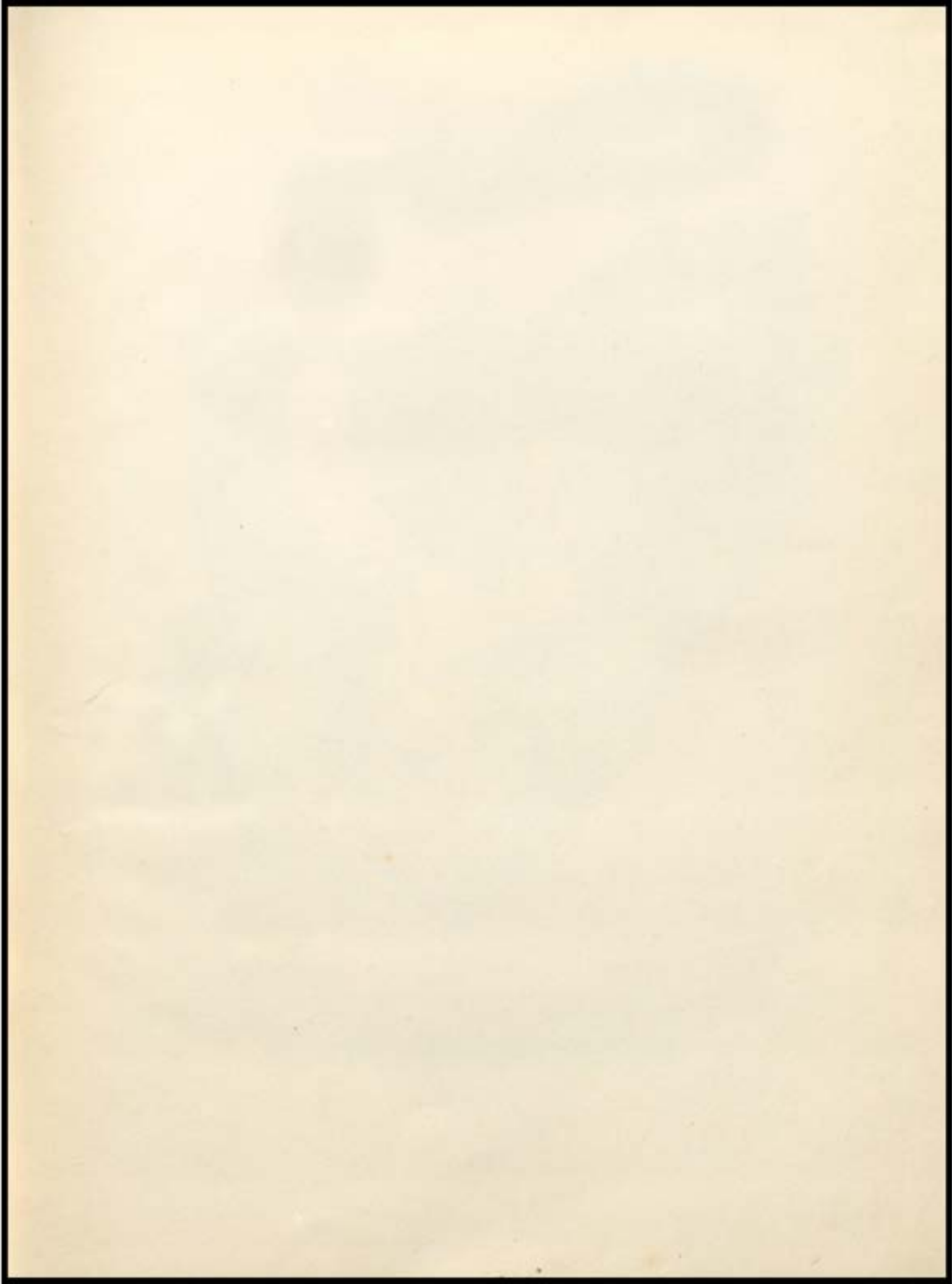


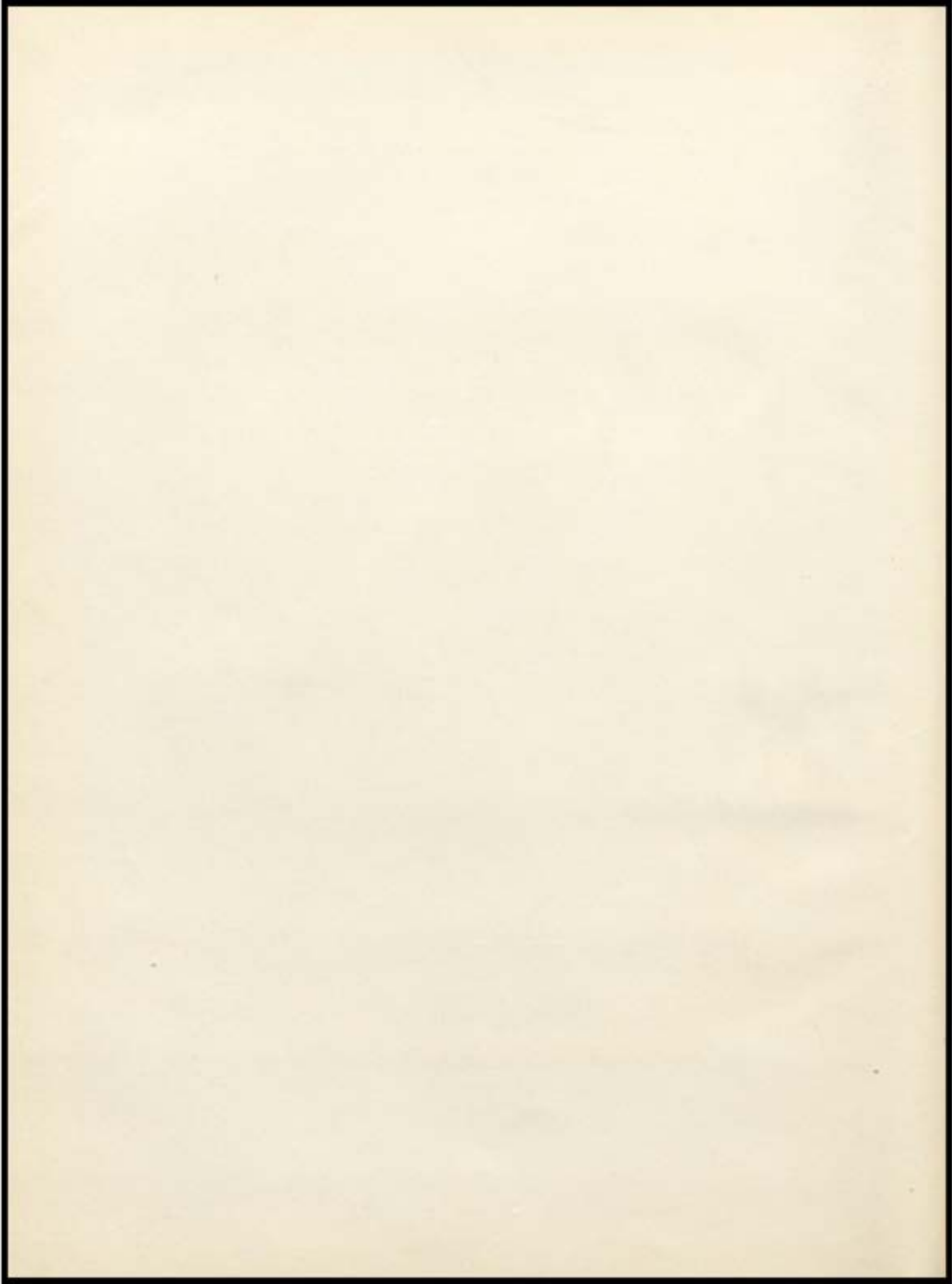

# *Class History*

The class elected the following officers: Urban Strobel, President; Josephine Strassel, Vice-President; Billie June Griepentstroh, Secretary and Treasurer; Robert Himmelheber, program chairman; Maxine Price and Jimmy Vance, Student Council members and Mr. Reel, sponsor.

Billie June Griepentstroh was elected as our candidate for basketball queen.

## CHAPTER III

We started our Junior year in a manner befitting our title---  
"Jolly Juniors."

In taking inventory of the students we found the following pupils missing: Paul Anderson, Ray Leslie, Geneva Barker, Jean Huff, Floyd Mulzer, Maxine Price, Helen Schaefer, Marion Skelton, Josephine Strassell, Urban Strobel and Danny Thomas.

In November of '49 our class sweaters arrived. They were gray with green emblems.

Dennis Shepherd won the "Allen Brooner Award" for outstanding playing ability and sportsmanship in the Spencer County Tourney.

Our Junior boys won the class basketball tourney of 1950. The cheerleaders were Eileen Meece, Darleen Meece and Billie June Griepenstroh.

On April 24, we honored the Seniors with a banquet. The theme carried out was an "Old-Fashioned Garden."

In 1950 the CHS football team was reorganized. Our Senior Class was proud to have eight players on the team.

Billie June Griepenstroh was elected football queen. She was crowned by Captain Tom Weber on October 25.

We now have four members of our class on the varsity basketball team. Norman Arnold has completed four years, Dennis Shepherd has completed three years and Robert Himmelheber and Johnny James have completed two years.

Darleen Meece a member of our class was elected basketball queen on January 27, 1951. She was crowned on February 14, at our Dale game.
