After having a bit of bad luck in the early stages of the season, the Dale Golden Aces rounded into one of the P, $A_{+} C_{\sim}$ 's best teams, under the very capable leadership of our new coach, Robert Simpson, We made Coach Simpson's debut a most successful one as we rolled over Richland 28-12 in a non-conference tilt, In our first conference game we battled one of the pre-season favorites, Petersburg, to a scoreless tie, for three quarters before falling in the final quarter 23-0. Dale falled to score 7 or 8 times after gerting the ball within 10 yards of a touchdown, Oaldand City's Acorns spoiled our first home game as the conference charges took another step toward a perfect season bombarding the Aces 47-24, Cannelton's rumer-up Bulldogs also took advantage of our early season misfortunes and ran up a 27-6 halfrime lead before holding on for a $34-19 \mathrm{win}$.

On the night of the coronation of QueenLinda Dike, the Aces came from behind, 21-12 at thehalf time tooverpower Richland 34-27, for our first conference victory. This victory started Dale on our drive which brought us from eighth to fifth place in the final P,A,C, standings. In our next outing we almost pulled the upset of the season as we went down fighting against the highly favored Owensville Kickapoos $14-12$, We scored a touchdown on the first play of the game to take a 6-0 lead. By halftime we had fallen behind 14-6, but trailed only 14-12 going into the Last quarter. Our rampaging Aces got the ball to the 3 rd yard line before furmbling with 30 seconds left, ending the exciting game, Dale continued to drive hard as we battled Mt, Vernon to a $6-6$ tie at the half. We played even again in the wild last half, finally coming home with a $28-28$ tie with the favored Wildcats. The Aces never trailed in this game.

The climax of the 1956 season came on the last game of the year as the Aces over powered arch rival Roclport to win easily 18-6, Our defense was one of the stoutest in the conference on this night, as the Zebras were held scoreless for three and a half quarters, Rockport's only touchdown came due to a Dale fumble late in the game. Nine seniors thus ended a glorious 4 year high school football career at D,H.S.
