The Class of 1964



Commencement exercises for the Class of 1964 were held Tuesday, May 19. The processional, "Pomp and Circumstance," was played by the high school band. Carole Winkler and Melvin Held, the highest girl and boy scholastically in the junior class, escorted the seniors to their seats in the front of the gymnasium. The address was given by Phil N. Eskew, Commissioner of the Indiana High School Athletic Association. Ronald Heady was valedictorian of the class; Nina Rae Tuley was salutatorian. Principal Charles Bockstahler presented the diplomas, and at last we were "graduates of Dale High School."



The salutatory speech expanded the class motto, "A step at a time carries one far." Comparing the first physical step of a child with the step into a new life taken by a graduate, Nina showed that no matter what path is chosen, there must be much thought before the first step, which will carry one far, is taken.

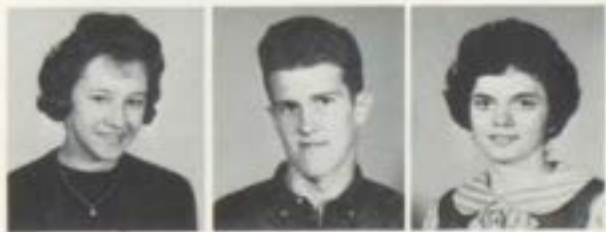

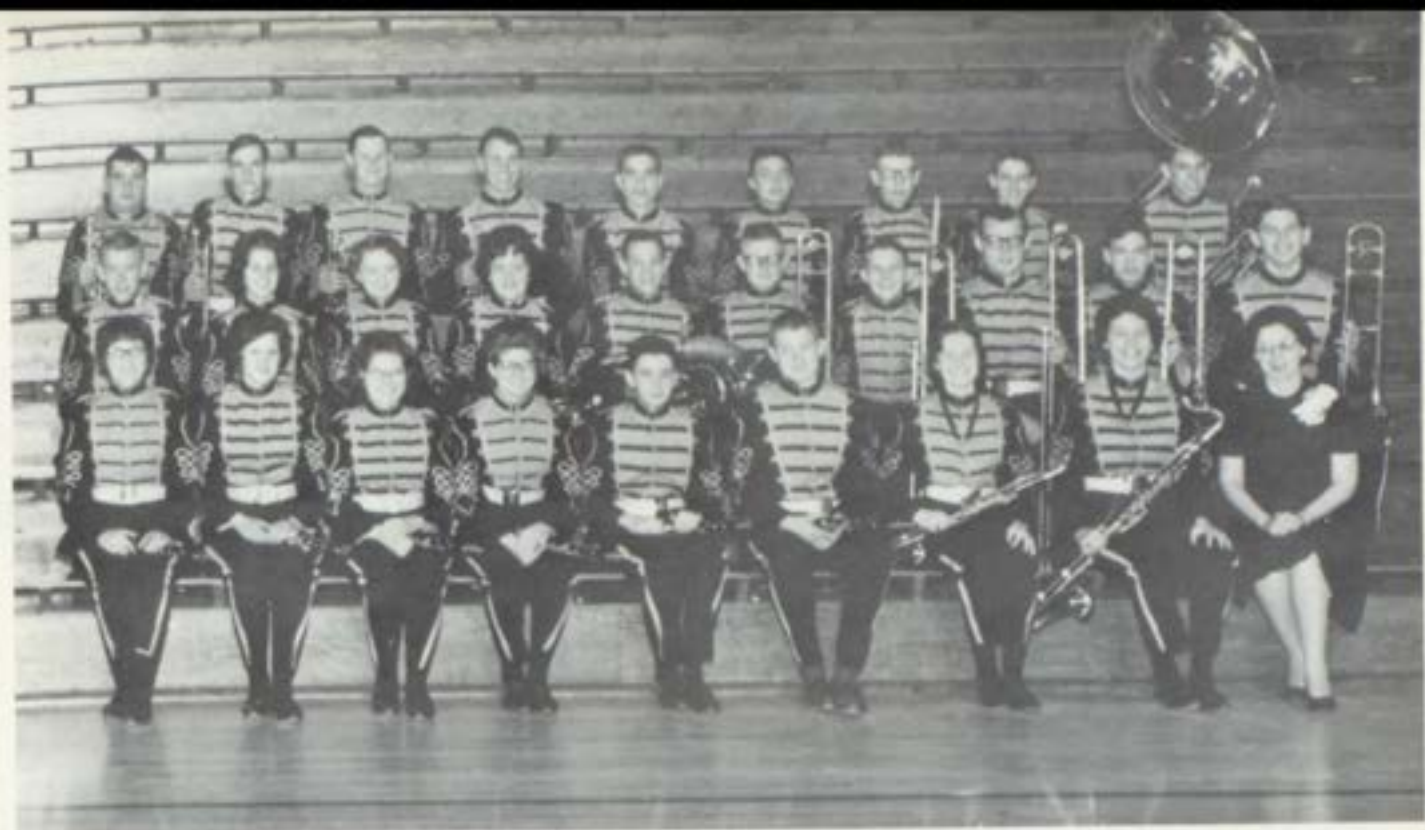
