The Athletic Department was enhanced this year when Coach Haskim developed Dale's first croar-country program. Only eight boys participated in the new sport and no meets were won, but there was success in that each runner had chopped several seconds off his rumning time by the end of the season. Practices conststed of striding long distances and sprinting danhes. Meets were held in September and October on a two-mile hill and dale course--usually a golf course--with all teams in one race.
