

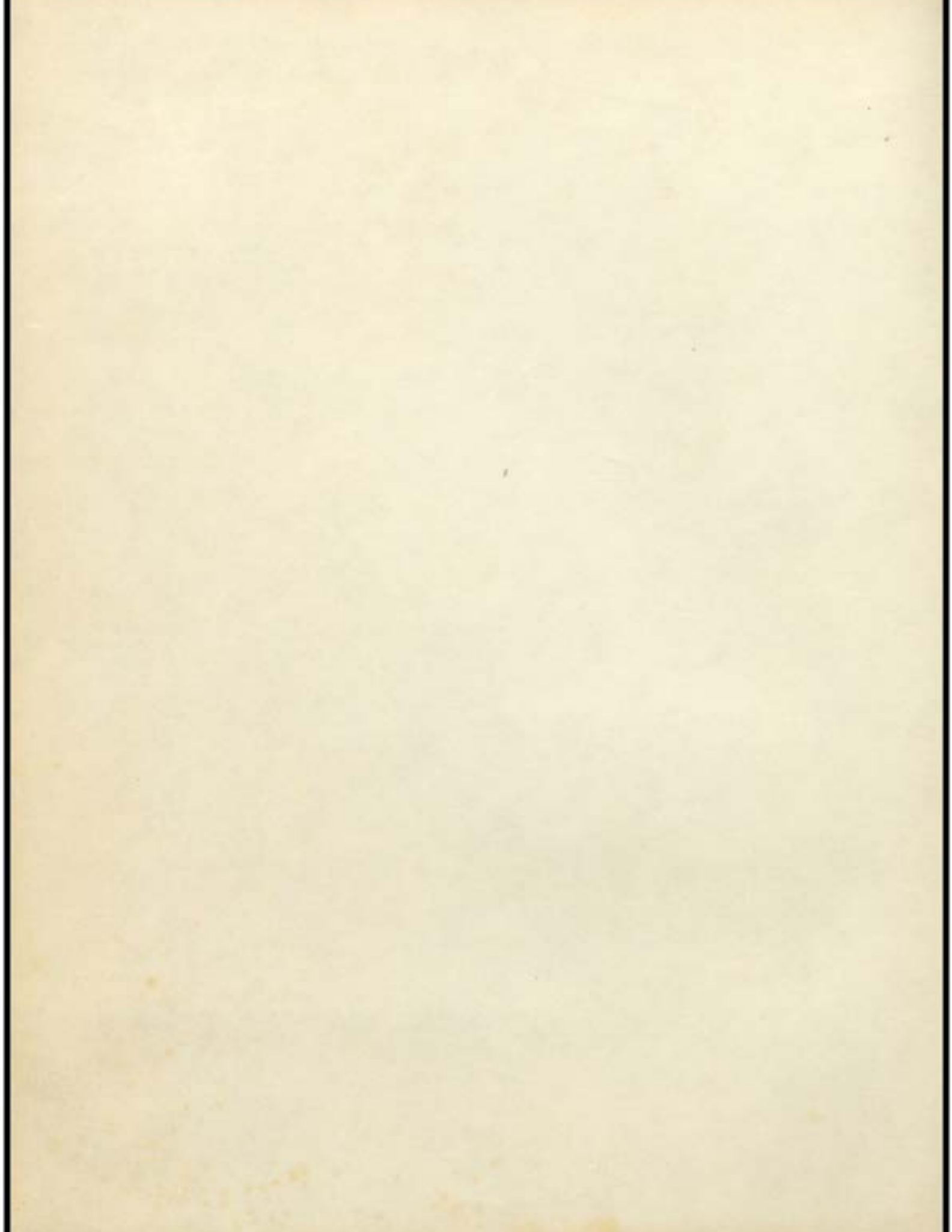

Running the two mile, a new IHSAA event this year, he led Dale to team victory over Cannelton and Perry Central with a time of 10:34 April 1, by far the best effort in Southern Indiana at that time.
