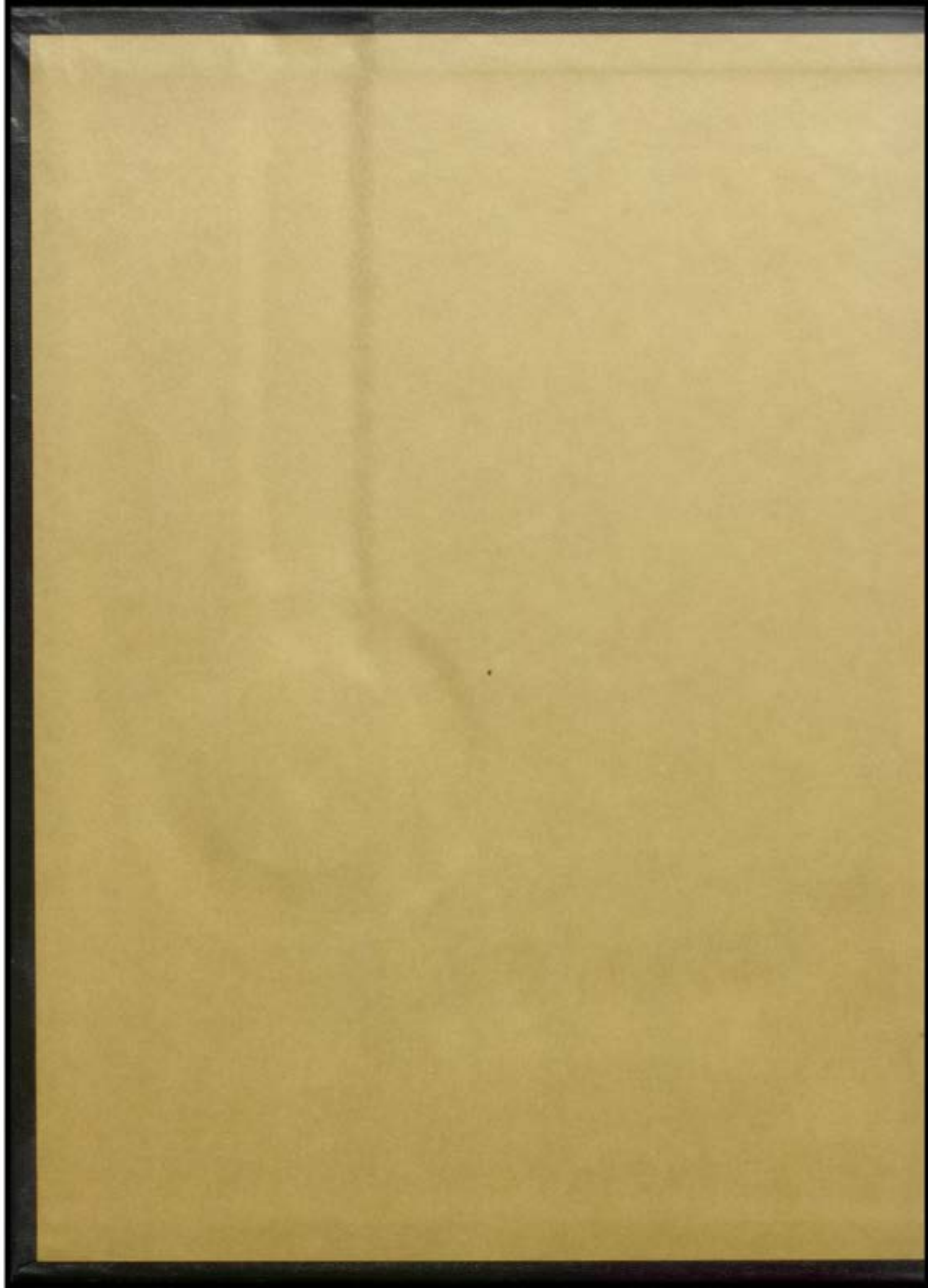
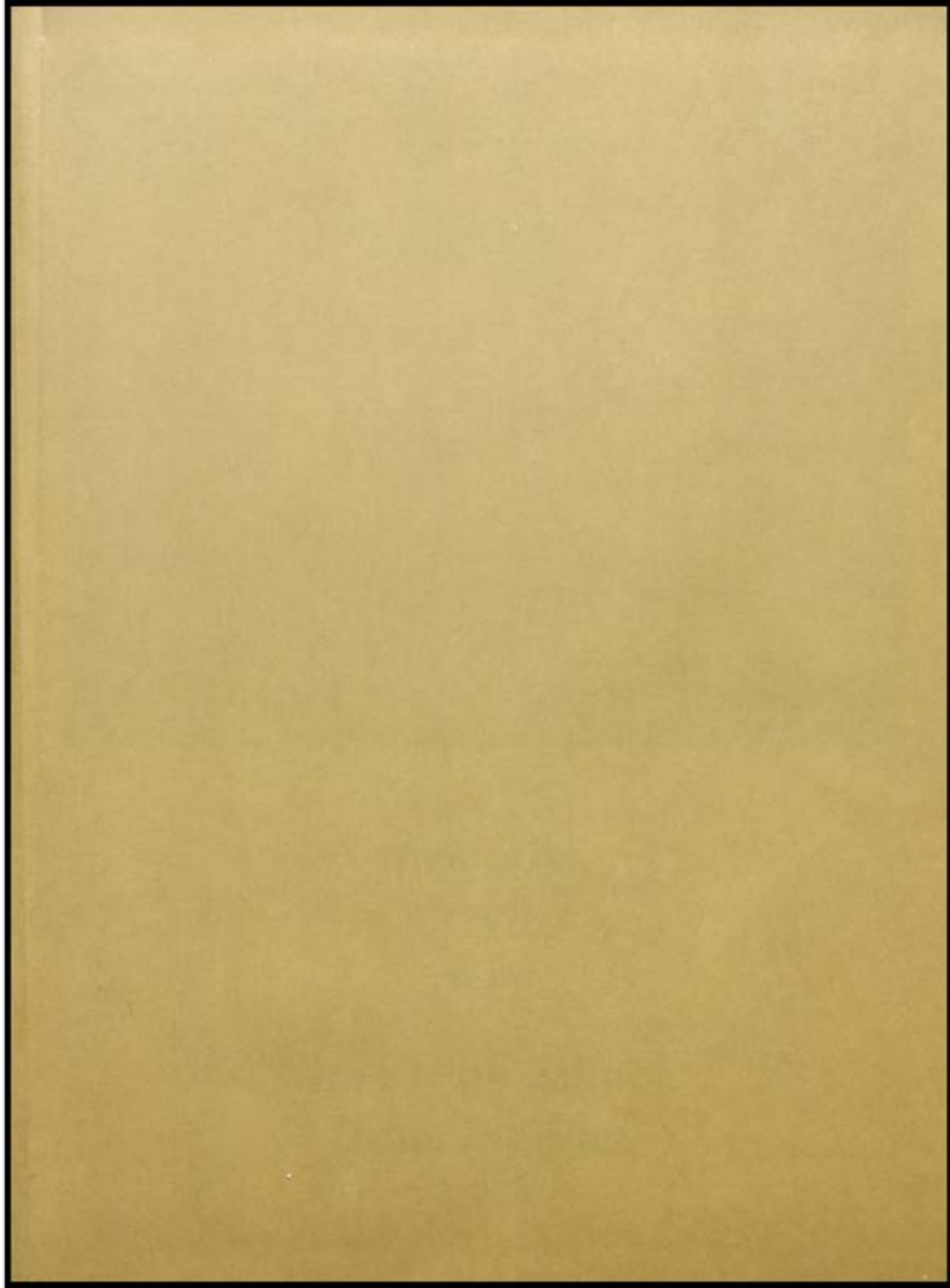
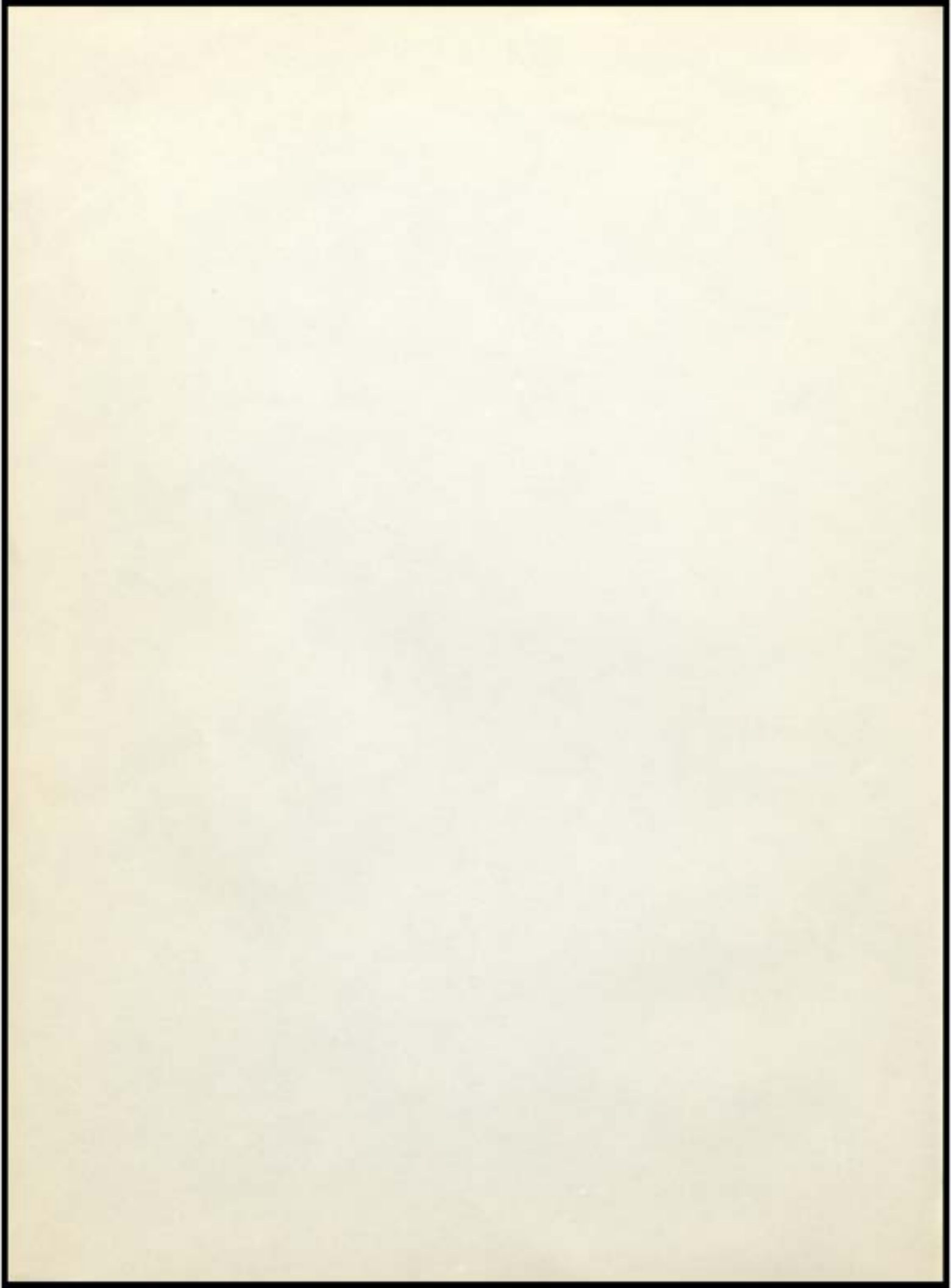

Talented Students Perform

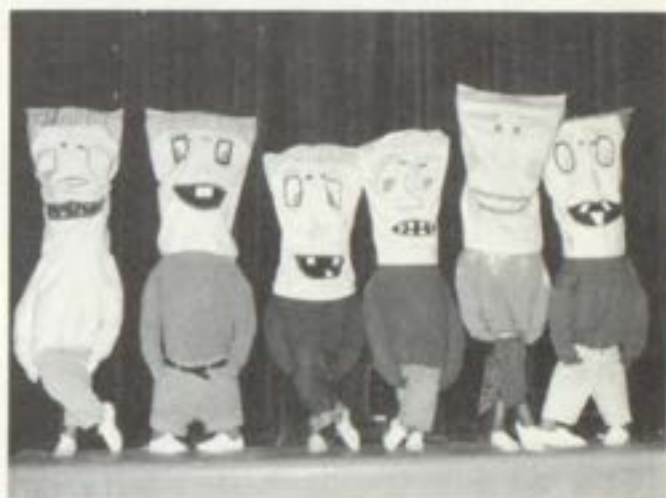

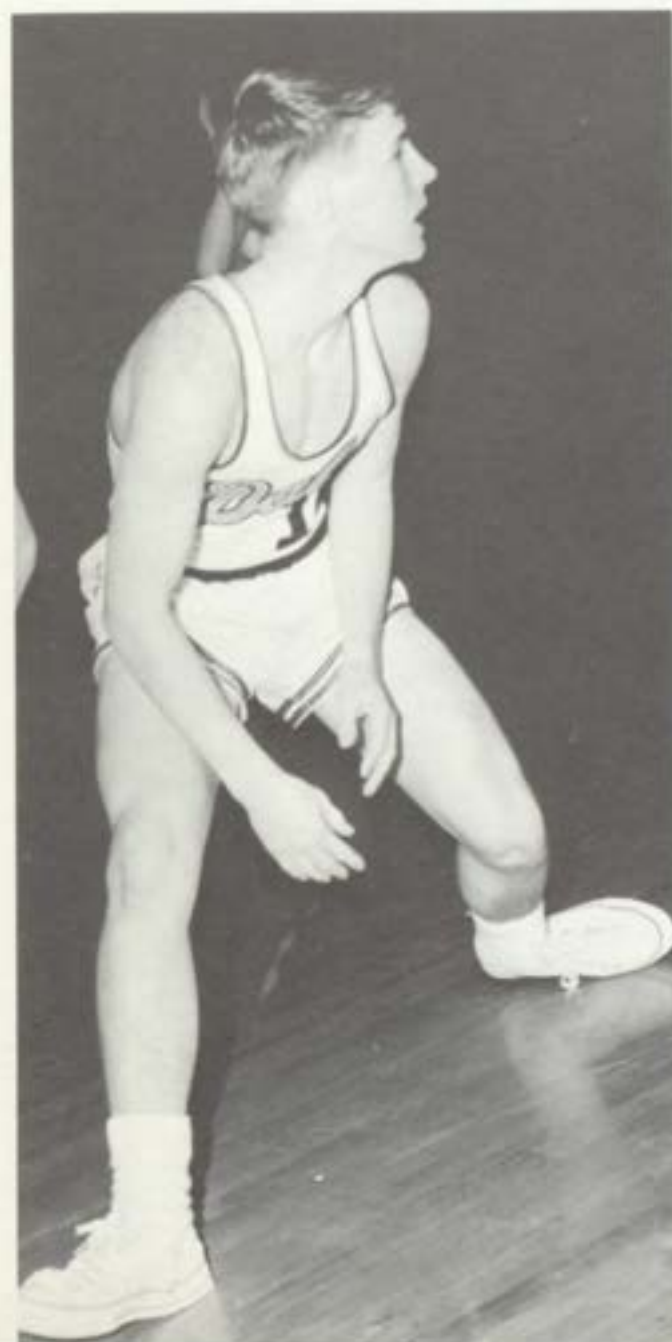

Aces Pull Through First 11 Man

Dale started its first 11-man football season with an expanded schedule, a new coach, and an updated field. With only three returning lettermen looking forward to new experiences, the Aces plunged headlong into a season of injury and defeat. Coach Green's leading pass receiver, Rick Graman, received injuries at the Petersburg game, and Bob Hagedorn, a leading rusher, received a shoulder injury during the Tecumseh game. Drained by these key injuries, the big, but inexperienced, Aces could only put together one complete game, a 20-0 blowout of Cannelton. Although Dale had a 1-8 season, they were honored to have two players, Cletus Seifert and Phil Miller, selected for PAC team. The Aces football future looks brighter. With the return of 21 lettermen next year, the team hopes to ignite the dwindling football spirit at DHS.

Strong Dale Track Team Captures

Breaking two records and winning five meets high-lighted a successful track season at DHS. Senior Dave Kress beat the old pole-vault record of 11' 2" with an 11' 3" jump. Junior Nick Hart erased the 440 record of 56.5 with a 56.4 dash. In various dual and triangular meets the Dale cindermen won a total of 115 blue ribbons. Winning 83 red and 53 white helped to bolster the Aces record. Scoring only 15 points, the Track Aces came in seventh in the PAC. Since the track team is losing only two lettermen, the Aces can look forward to another successful track season next year.

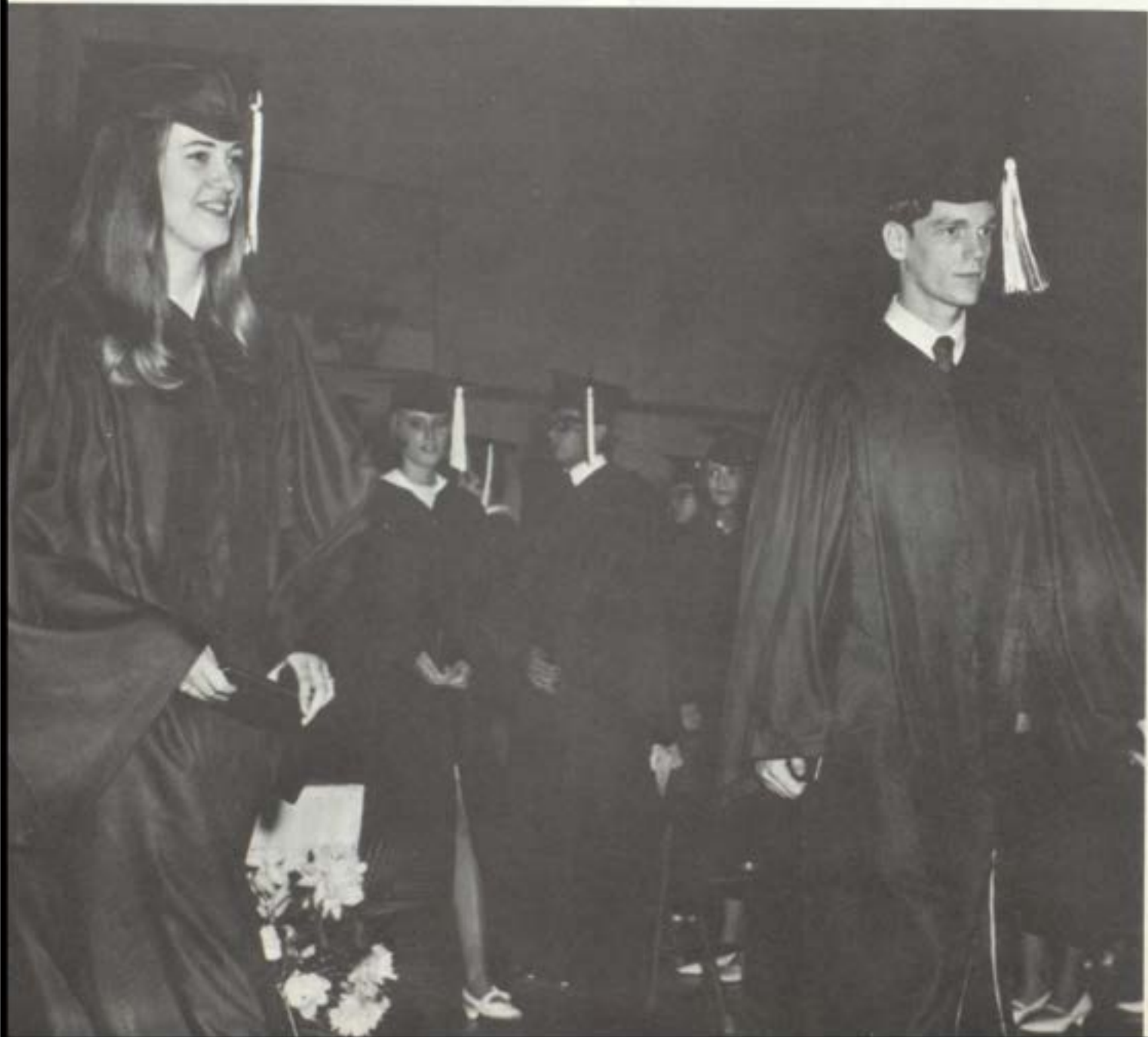
