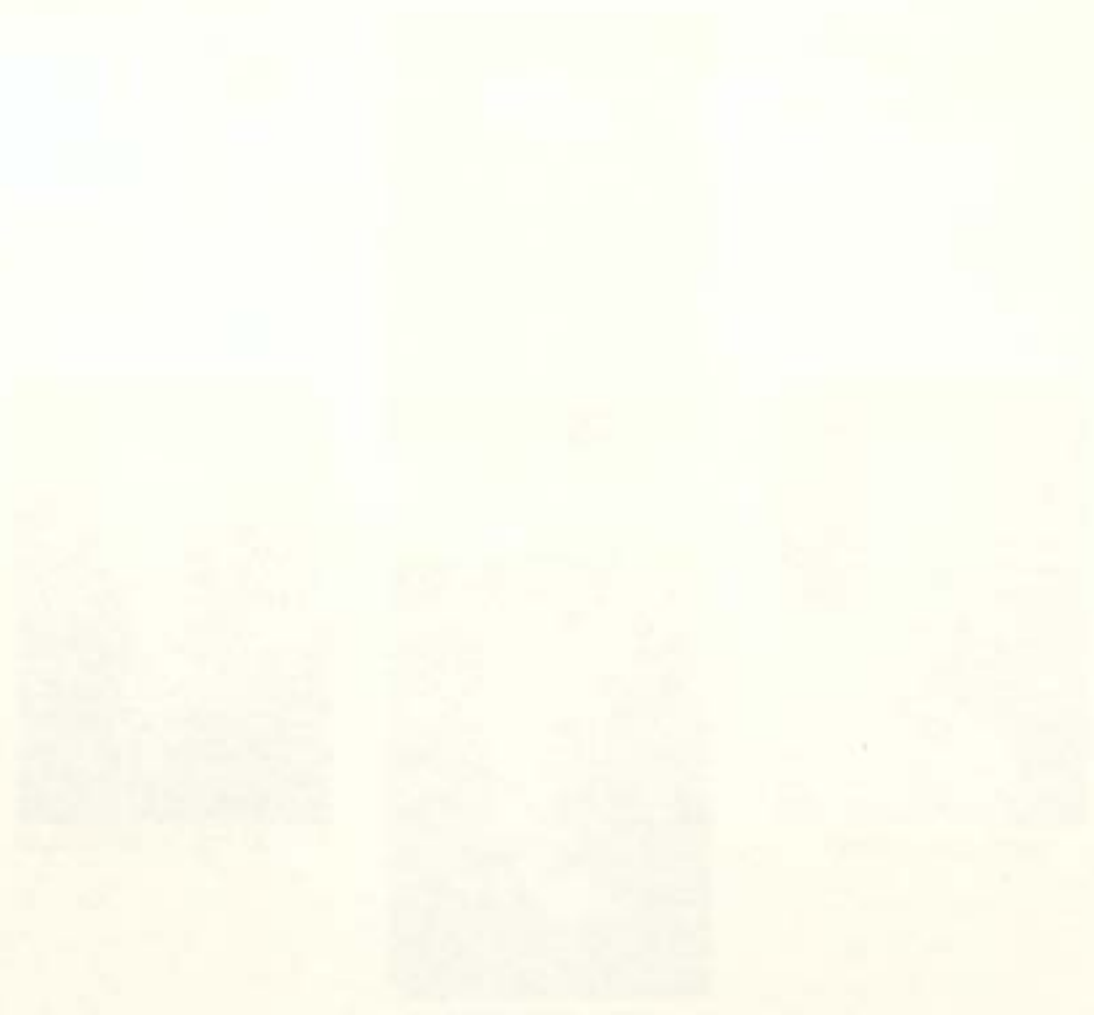
SENIOR PLAY

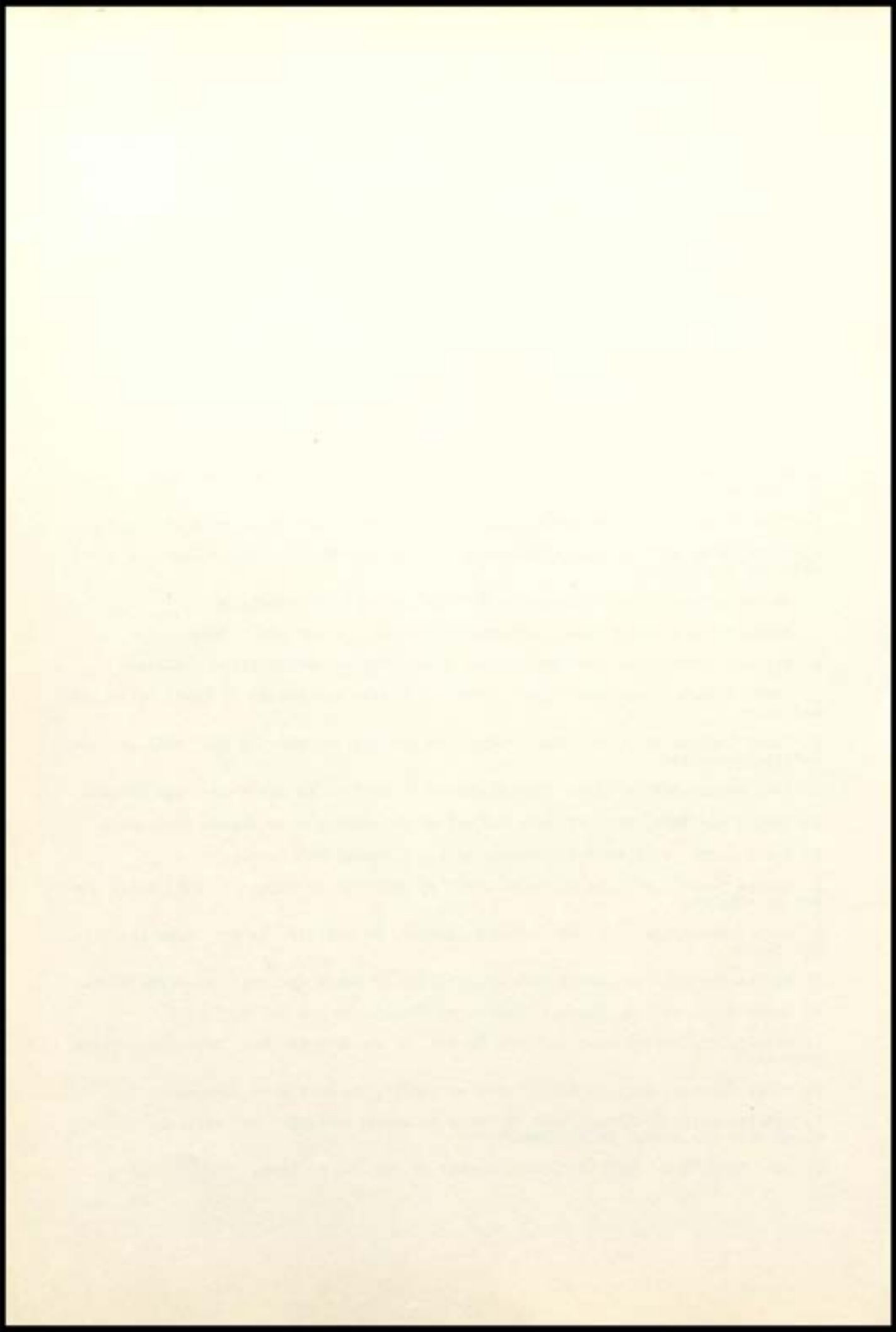

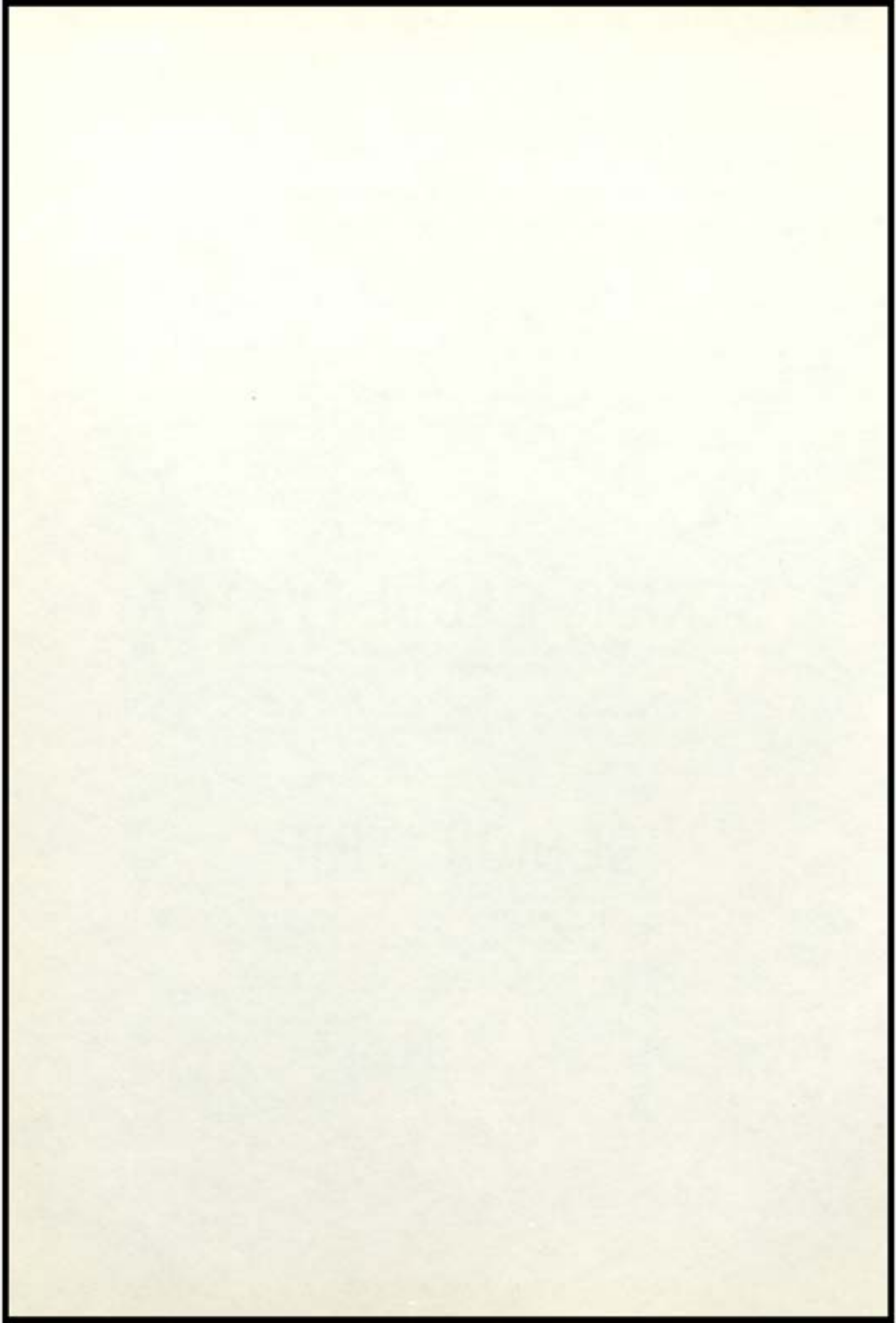
SENIOR TRIP

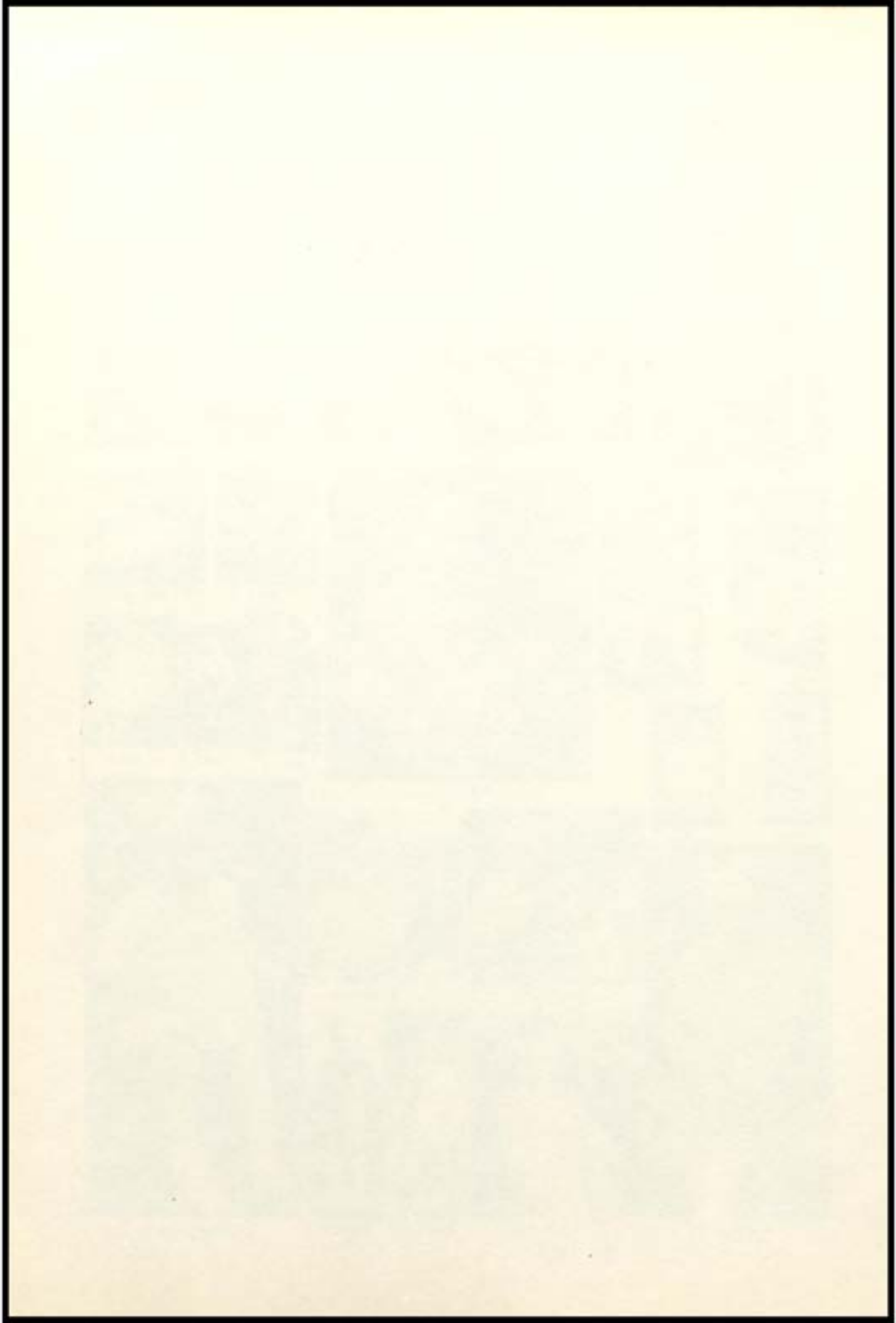

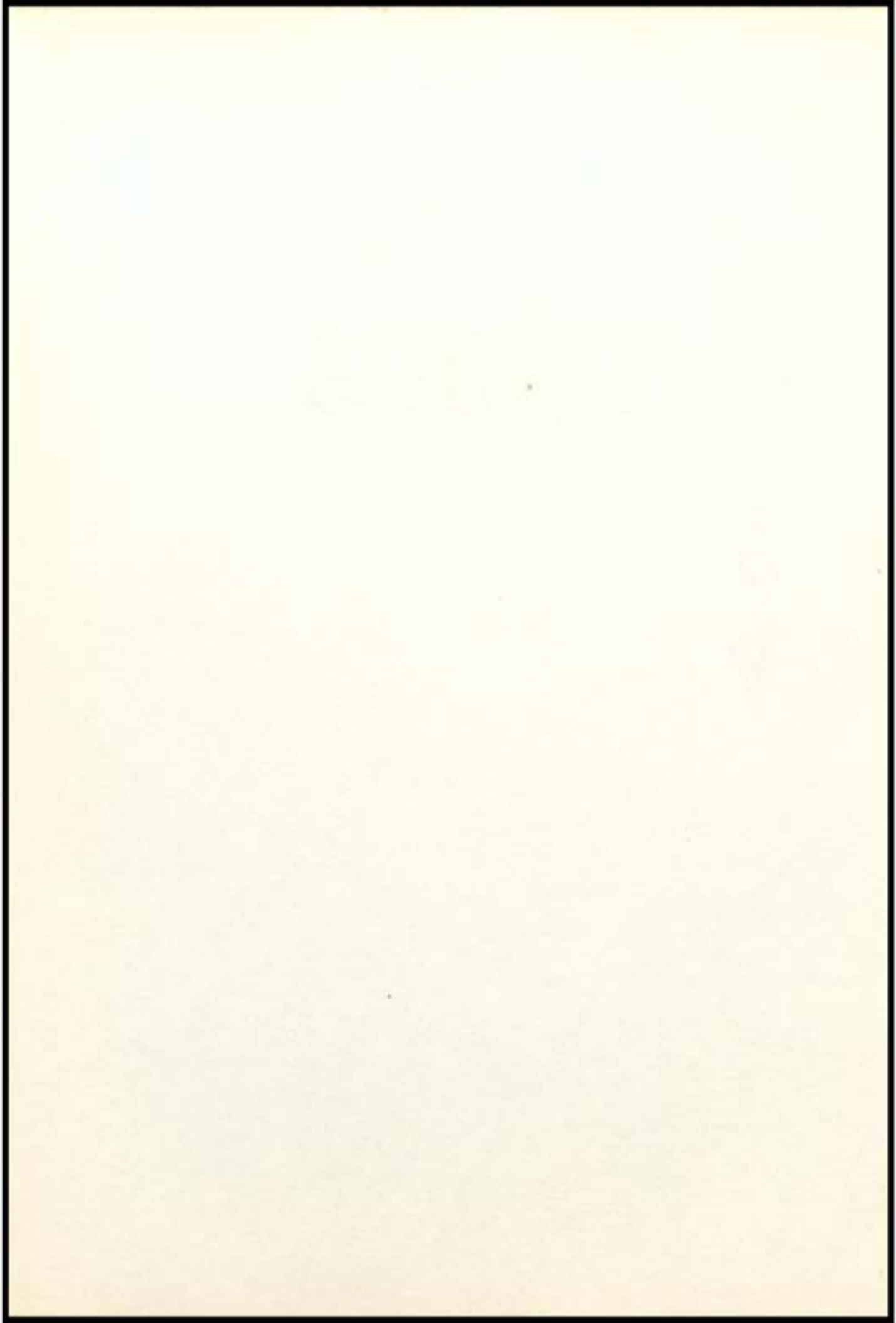

With Miss McDaniel's help, the junior class gave their class play-a three act comedy entitled "Out of This World."

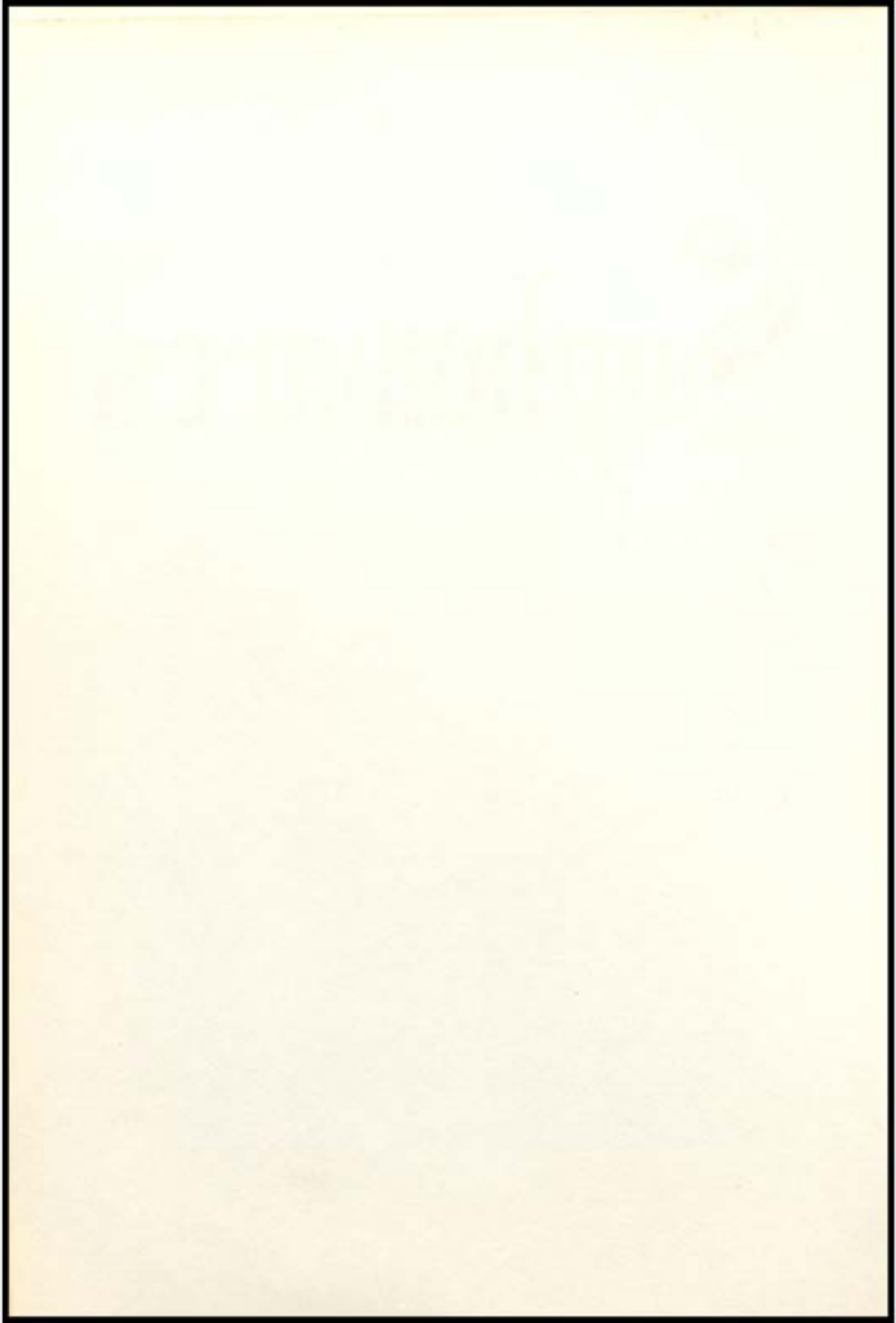
